At UB, we believe in learning through doing. Because getting experience by working is a crucial step in making your impact on the world.





- 1 Pay your deposit.
- 2 Apply for housing.
- 3 Activate your UBIT account and email.
- 4 Register for Orientation.
- 5 Submit your Health Background Form.



## 1. Pay your deposit.

Visit [buffalo.edu/internationaladmissions/deposits](http://buffalo.edu/internationaladmissions/deposits) to pay your \$150 tuition deposit online.

### DEADLINES

Fall semester tuition deposit must be received by **May 1** or within 10 days of your acceptance letter, whichever is later.

Spring semester tuition deposit must be received by **Dec. 1** or within 10 days of your acceptance letter, whichever is later.

*NOTE: If you miss the deadline, your tuition deposit is accepted if space is available. Your deposit is applied to your tuition charges; your confirmation page is your receipt.*

## 2. Apply for on-campus housing.

If you're going to live on campus, visit [buffalo.edu/internationaladmissions/deposits](http://buffalo.edu/internationaladmissions/deposits) to submit your \$300 housing deposit, agree to the terms of the Campus Living Housing Agreement and secure your place in the residence halls.

*NOTE: Your housing AND tuition deposits must be made to secure a space for you in the residence halls.*

### DEADLINES

Fall semester housing deposit must be received by **May 1**.

Spring semester housing deposit must be received by **Dec. 1**.

Don't wait! Rooms are assigned based on your preferences and in the order that we receive deposits. Students who miss these deadlines must submit a residence hall waiting list application. Room assignments are offered only if space becomes available.

*NOTE: Residence hall contracts are for both fall and spring semesters.*

### ACCOMMODATION REQUESTS

When your deposit is received, Campus Living will contact you. Then, you can enter preferences online for room type, room size, residential complex and campus, as well as preferences for roommates and living-learning programs.

All communications from Campus Living will be sent to the email address you submitted when you applied to the university. If you want to be contacted at a different email address, please contact the Campus Living office at **+1-716-645-2171**.

*NOTE: If you have religious requirements, disability-related needs or other accommodation needs, please submit the Housing Accommodation Request Form. The form requires documentation from a qualified professional.*

## 3. Activate your UBIT account and email.

Your UBITName is the username that you will use to log into a variety of campus services. Activation is required to begin New International Student Check-In, to register for classes and to access your UBmail.

Begin by visiting [buffalo.edu/ubit/activate](http://buffalo.edu/ubit/activate) and click on "New International Student."

### YOU WILL NEED:

- Your UBITName and one-time password, which will be sent via email by International Admissions or Campus Living (if you are a housing applicant).
- The last 4 digits of your Person Number, which is included in your admission letter from International Admissions.


## DINING OPTIONS

On-campus dining options accommodate a wide variety of dietary needs, including vegan, vegetarian and kosher. All-you-can-eat dining halls are conveniently located in every residence hall complex and are open to all students. Cooking is not allowed in residence hall rooms, but kitchens are available in all residence halls and apartments.

*NOTE: Any registered UB student may purchase a UB Dining Meal Plan, whether you live on or off campus. First-year students living in residence halls are required to purchase a Dining Services plan.*

## 4. Begin check-in online to register for Orientation.

New International Student Check-In is a series of electronic forms (e-forms) that provides UB with important information about you and your immigration status. Completion of the check-in is a requirement for all new F-1 and J-1 students. It also automatically registers you for International Orientation and Welcome Series.

### ORIENTATION PROVIDES YOU WITH THE TOOLS YOU NEED TO START YOUR LIFE AT UB, INCLUDING:

- Opportunities to meet and socialize with other UB students.
- Information sessions on immigration regulations, UB academic policy, U.S. law and on-campus safety.
- Assistance setting up bank accounts, cell phone service and Social Security number (if eligible).
- Campus tours and information about university resources.
- Help with registering for classes and getting your UB card.

## 5. Submit your Health Background Form.

New York State requires all UB students born on or after Jan. 1, 1957, to provide proof of immunity against measles, mumps and rubella. Students must also receive information about meningococcal disease and make an informed decision about whether to receive this immunization.

**UB students will not be allowed to register for classes until they have fulfilled these requirements.**
