Living hand to mouth

A sobering stat - in 2009, one in four jobs in the Buffalo region were in an occupation where the median wage was below the poverty line for a family of four. That according to a new policy brief from the State University of New York at Buffalo's Regional Institute.

According to federal guidelines, that poverty line is about \$22,000. The median wage of WNY jobs in 2009 was \$31.800. And between 2004 and 2008, jobs in low-paying occupations grew 17 percent, according to UB research, while high-paying jobs grew 6 percent and medium-wage jobs DECLINED by 10 percent.

While the research brief focuses on the Buffalo-Niagara Falls metro area, the stats and trends for Rochester - which has seen a similar decline in its well-paying manufacturing base in the past couple generations - are likely similar. And in fact I'll have to do some digging and see what I can find out.

On a side note, Penn State's Living Wage Calculator estimates that in Monroe County, living wage - meaning what a person must make if working full time in order to cover typical expenses - for a single adult is \$9.06 an hour, while fora family of four it's \$29.72 an hour.

So what are the lifelines to this growing cadre of low-wage workers? According to the UB brief, they range from individuals tighening their belts personally and investing in education, employers providing good wages and benefits, and government providing a secure safety net.


