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Does research into disease, ticks and malt liquor use stimulate the economy?

U.S. taxpayers will pay 162,000 for a study that sends college students into the wild to collect ticks and plant them on lab mice.

Another grant will pay \$25 each to 100 residents of the Pacific Island of Palau for scientists to draw samples of their blood.

Americans will pay \$783,000 for a study that invites 100 malt liquor and marijuana users in Buffalo to call in and punch numbers on the telephone to record their habits each day. Each will be paid at least \$45 for their time.

The studies are paid for by the \$787 billion economic recovery act, an unprecedented effort intended to jump-start the economy, make jobs and modernize the nation's infrastructure, energy independence and health care systems.

Academic researchers are pleased with the extra billions of dollars to make advances in understanding diseases, drugs and global warming. But the spending raises the question: Can two years of academic research make jobs and stimulate the economy?

The <u>National Institutes of Health</u>, the country's top research agency, is awarding recovery money to projects proposed long before the recession. With S8 billion extra dollars to spend on research, agency officials went back to the

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list of projects that had been the expose, the state rescinded the sign requirement, saving as much as \$900,000.

They looked for projects that could be done in two years, with no

turned down.

special emphasis on job creation and no requirement that the scientists buy equipment made in America.

Scientists whose ideas did not make the cut last year are answering surprise telephone calls from government officials, announcing the projects would be funded after all.

When President Barack Obama first talked about spending billions of stimulus dollars on health science research, Rick Ostfeld's tick study had been sitting on a shelf for two years at the Cary Institute of Ecological Studies in Millbrook.

Ostfeld said he did not think of his own work when he first heard the president talk about recovery money for scientific research. Peer reviewers gave Ostfeld's proposal high marks, but it was not funded by President Bush's administration.

On June 1, Ostfeld escorted U.S. Rep. Scott Murphy through a tick-infested forest to show him how he would spend recovery money to study how global warming is affecting the tick population.

The study will be done both in Millbrook and at Syracuse's State University College of Environmental Science and Forestry. The grant will pay one researcher at each school to work during the summer and will allow them to hire three full-time students to help in the summer and two part-time students to work during the school year, he said.

"We had submitted this proposal well before there was any whispering of a stimulus package," he said. "We were the beneficiaries after the fact."

Jobs aren't a requirement

Last year, the NIH granted about \$24 billion to academic institutions and small businesses for research. Obama has proposed increasing that to \$30.1 billion next year.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act will boost that spending by about \$4 billion a year for two years.

Sally Rockey, acting deputy director for extramural research at the NIH, said the agency did not choose projects based on the jobs they would create.

Most of the money would pay the salaries of technicians, students, postdoctorate students and investigators, she said. The agency intends to track the number of jobs created and retained, she said.

Colleges and universities are often the largest employers in cities the size of Syracuse, and communities will benefit from equipment purchases and construction projects, Rockey said. The agency also intends to grant about \$1 billion for construction, renovation and repair at these institutions.

"I think you have to think about the dual role of this package, which is not only to stimulate the economy and create jobs, but to advance science," she said

The first NIH grant to Syracuse University is a \$70,000 award for a Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs professor to study the health consequences of teenage childbirth. A second-year award could bring the cost to \$130.000.

Leonard Lopoo, associate professor in Maxwell's Center for Policy Research, applied for the grant in summer 2008. He said Washington lawmakers need more information about how teen pregnancy affects mothers and babies. He will analyze data collected by the Texas Health Department to better understand how teen pregnancy affects the mother's education, her need for public assistance and the child's future needs.

The grant will pay a summer salary in addition to his annual nine-month salary from Syracuse University. It will allow him to hire one graduate student this summer. He will also use the money to buy computer equipment, he said

Mental illness in Pacific

Four grants totaling about \$1 million have been awarded to SUNY Upstate Medical University. The studies involve heart disease, drug research, multiple sclerosis and schizophrenia.

Marina Myles-Worsley, professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at SUNY Upstate Medical University, said the schizophrenia research began in 1989. She travels to Palau, in the Pacific, to study the large number of cases that appear to run in families in the genetically isolated population of about 20,000 people.

The project has been continually funded by the NIH and a private foundation since 1995. The \$109,000 recovery act grant will allow researchers to analyze blood samples from 100 more people, she said.

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Each Palauan participant will be paid \$25. The chemicals, equipment and lab processing for genotyping cost \$475 per subject and come from a U.S. company, she said. The grant will also help pay part of the salaries of two Syracuse-based researchers who will analyze the DNA samples, she said.

R. Lorraine Collins, a professor of health behavior and associate dean for research at the school of public health and health professions at the University at Buffalo, SUNY, said she reduced her proposal from four years to two years to fit the requirements of the recovery spending.

She will receive slightly less than \$400,000 per year to study malt liquor and marijuana use. The study builds on previous research that showed that about half of the people who drink malt liquor were also regular marijuana smokers. She wants to know what is going on when people use the two together and separately.

About 100 participants will be asked to call in every day for three weeks and answer questions about whether they consumed alcohol or marijuana and whether they were alone or with friends or at a party or at home.

"Understanding those kinds of questions can have important implications for treatment," she said.

She will employ three full-time people for two years. The grant will also pay part of her salary.

At both SUNY schools, the researchers said they will not get salary increases. The federal grant is applied toward their salaries and the state-run universities can use the money saved for something else.

Foreign-made equipment

The largest grants to Cornell University so far will allow the school to buy about \$3 million in equipment -- an MRI scanner and two microscopes. The three grant proposals were on the waiting list at NIH.

Scientists are testing microscopes to decide which one to buy. They are all manufactured in Germany and Japan, said Rebecca Williams, a research scientist in biomedical engineering.

She said she thought the grant award for equipment seemed "a little weird" at first for a program intended to stimulate the economy. The \$500,000 grant will not create any jobs in the U.S.

"Here we are sending our money to Germany or Japan, whereas we're having some problems keeping staff right now," she said.

There's an American-made requirement on the steel used for stimulus road projects, but not for equipment bought with the research grants, said the NIH's Rockey.

"It's likely in the scientific world that a lot of equipment is not made in the United States," she said.

Bird-banding records

The National Science Foundation, the Army Corps of Engineers, the departments of defense, energy, interior and justice, and other agencies are also spending recovery money on research.

Many of these proposals also describe work that can be done quickly: replace equipment, manage data and make maps.

The Army Corps of Engineers' spending plan includes ship simulation modeling in Alaska, monitoring salmon habitat in the Puget Sound and making floodplain maps in Idaho and Montana.

The U.S. Geological Survey will spend \$140 million in recovery money, including \$15 million to update volcano monitoring equipment, \$29 million for earthquake equipment and \$488,000 to put online half a million paper records about bird banding.

The U.S. Department of Justice plans to award \$2 million in grants for field research that improves its ability to prosecute Internet crimes against children.

The National Institute of Mental Health is using recovery money to evaluate the effectiveness of a training program for telephone crisis counselors at suicide hotline centers. The first year of the two-year grant will cost about \$800,000.

Like all scientific research, the end result is information. It will be

disseminated to other scientists at meetings and conferences and in journal articles. If the results are useful, scientists will return to NIH for more money to finance the next step.

Transparent spending

The NIH is putting information about each grant on its Web site.

Anyone can search projects by congressional district or institution, read the project description, find the grant amount and even the e-mail address for the lead researcher. There is a section called "results," where published journal articles and patents will be listed.

ARRA funding requires grant recipients to make more information transparent. Scientists have had their research ideas tested and accepted by their peers. Now, they have to vet their ideas before the taxpaying public.

The scientists interviewed for this story were enthusiastic about describing their proposals, but they were less interested in talking about specifics and money. They are used to keeping confidential information about their subjects and prefer not to let the public know, for example, how much they pay them or where they collect their ticks.

Lopoo was defensive about explaining how his grant to study teen pregnancy would stimulate the economy.

"When I applied for this, the idea wasn't that I was going to stimulate the economy," he said. "It was that I was going to do some research."

He said people should not compare the number of jobs created by science grants with the number of jobs created by hard-hat transportation projects because the goals of science are different.

"I don't make new roads. I don't make bridges," Lopoo said. "But I do improve our knowledge of a particular phenomenon and I think that can be just as valuable."

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

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
