## 'Moral stand' paying off for members of 1958 Buffalo team

Gerry Gergley remembers what went through his mind when his 1958 University of Buffalo football team was invited to the Tangerine Bowl.

"It's cold in Buffalo," he thought, warming to the idea. "And we're going to Florida."

Only they didn't. Organizers in Orlando said the Bulls could not bring African-American players Willie Evans and Mike Wilson. The team voted and said, under those terms, no thanks.

Now, more than half a century later, 34 of 41 living players, coaches and staff from the 1958 team are going to Orlando for Saturday night's game between the University of Central Florida and University at Buffalo, as UB is now known.

"We made a moral stand and we did what was right," Gergley says. "It wasn't a hard decision. They were our teammates. Willie was Willie, and we couldn't go without him, not to mention he was our leading scorer."

Buffalo was named top small-college team in the East in 1958, and the Bulls were invited to play Florida State in the Tangerine. It was the only bowl bid in UB history until last season, when the Bulls won the Mid-American Conference and earned a bid to the International Bowl in Toronto, where they lost to Connecticut. Members of the 1958 team went along on that trip, too.

"It wasn't warm, like Florida, but we had a great time," Gergley says. "We thought that would be the end of it."

But Orange County Mayor Richard Crotty wanted the region to make amends. He called UCF, which called Florida Citrus Sports, which runs the Capital One and Champs Sports bowls, to see what could be done for the 1958 Bulls when UB came to town. Loews offered to put them up at its Orlando resort. AirTran offered to fly them.

Gergley, 70, doesn't need airfare. Destiny brought him to Orlando long ago.

He was Buffalo's wrestling coach and an assistant football coach in the mid-to-late 1960s, until UB dropped football in 1970. (It returned in 1977.)

"So I went to a little school in Florida, only 1,000 students, to start a wrestling program," Gergley says. "It was called Florida Technological University then. Now UCF has 50,000 students and is one of the largest in the country."

He coached the Central Florida wrestling team to a 108-42 record from 1970-80. (It was disbanded in 1985.) He also started the men's golf program and assisted in the planning for the Knights' first football team.

Gergley was named to UCF's athletics hall of fame in 2003. He retired in 2007. These days he and wife Jacquie — high school sweethearts from Kenmore, a Buffalo suburb — split time between Orlando and the mountains of North Carolina.

"I'm a halfback," Gergley says. "I came from Buffalo to Florida - and now I'm halfway back."

Gergley was actually a fullback and linebacker on the 1958 team. Evans was the star halfback.

"My teammates want to give me credit (for the weekend's festivities)," Gergley says. "I just happen to live here and got old here."

The get-together in Toronto seemed like "our last ride together," in the words of Jack Dempsey, a tackle on that team. Now, the 1958 Bulls ride again.

So for whom will Gergley root Saturday - UCF or UB?

"I started a Bull, and I became a Knight," Gergley says. "But Jack Dempsey tells me, 'Once a Bull, always a Bull.' "

That doesn't really answer it.

"Let's put it this way," Gergley says. "Either way, I can't lose."

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## Fifty years later, Buffalo players get trip to Orlando
