Vincent Barras teaches history of medicine and science at the University of Lausanne, while also specializing in sound art, experimental literature and sound poetry, which he practices as author, performer, translator, editor, and publisher. *Voicing Through Saussure*, a work of sound poetry with Jacques Dermierre, was published as a triple CD (2014) and made into a film by Véronique Goël (2009).

Jacques Demierre is a pianist, composer, and improviser, who performs music, sound poetry, and sound interventions *in situ*, and has collaborated widely with many renowned sound artists, poets, and musicians, presented in many international contexts and recorded on labels internationally. He is 2007 laureate of the Ville de Genève Music Award and of the Swiss Music Prize 2018.
