As both rhetorician and news editor, I share my experience with my students in Public Speaking and Written Communication. I help them see the classroom as a microcosm of the outside world. That is, like a newspaper, their work in class is always editorial and rhetorical too. If done according to sound principles of research-based formal speaking

and writing and the art of rhetoric, we can distinguish truth from falsehood, be open to different views and persuade others of our own.
