Earlier this year, Orlando Mayor **Richard Crotty** decided to make amends and set in motion the old-timers' VIP weekend trip, free of charge.

At 70-something, the 1958 players couldn't play, but they did the next best thing: They watched the new Bulls nearly upset the UCF Knights.

Oh, yes! They also received an official apology from the city at midfield during halftime.

Former halfback Evans told the UCF paper: "We appreciate the fact that there is interest in our story and that we are going to be honored at the game. More importantly, it gives us an opportunity to get together as a team one more time, and we are grateful for that."
