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PROGRAM

Electric Vehicles – Ryan McPherson (Sustainability) & Chris Austin (Parking)

- Ryan owns two personal electric vehicles; UB has an expanding fleet
- Why EV's?
 - o taking over from hybrids
 - as built environment improves transportation becomes our major source of CO2
 - 36% of UB's carbon production is from transportation (UB ICECAP) / commuting is 21%
 - students: 44.5% commute by car alone, 35% public transit
 - employees: 87% car, 6% public transit
 - o NYS/SUNY support and require reduced emissions
 - o electric motors are more efficient (even with battery resource costs)
 - Facilities has support for sustainable transportation: 100 protected storage spaces, 50 bike share bikes, 4 charging stations
 - o but very easy and fast to drive to campus and public transit options are poor
 - discussion how to disincentivise solo drivers (elevate cost, real cost of parking)
- EV's at UB (pilot program) and where we're going
 - Three types of chargers:
 - Level 1, plug into wall
 - Level 2, 240v stations
 - Level 3, 440v fast charging stations (future)
 - real cost to UB is trench/running power from nearby lines
 - demand for EVs has risen and now greatly exceeds supply
 - o stations meant to be cheap and visible, to encourage use and give a boost during the day
 - 400 self-reported users including hybrids and 40-50 registered users
 - newer models don't need to be charged during the day (e.g. Volt) but WNY charging infrastructure is still very weak
 - O/ What is actual value of a charge?
 - A/ 6 stations over five years: \$1,500 p.a. (MUCH less than cost of gas)
- Where is EV industry going?
 - o enormous global rise in use, by 2022 predicted to cost the same as internal combustion
 - o manufacturers are switching most/all of their entire line-ups to EV
 - still working out storage solutions
 - shared use + Autonomous + Electric
- EV Working Group formed Dec. 2018
 - o Capital Planning & Design + Sustainability + Controller + Parking & Transportation
 - o four sub-groups: policy & funding, grant applications, infrastructure & siting; campus fleet
 - Infrastructure:
 - Level 2 chargers around campus spine (South & North)
 - Level 1 chargers at CFT
 - Level 3 fast charger at CFT
 - Trying to decide whether/how to charge
 - Allen (5 units); Parker (2); Ketter (5); Jacobs B (5); Sherman (3); Helm (fleet)
 - NFTA Route 35 bus terminates on campus (Flint Loop)
 - NYSERDA funding for the station (not supply)

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- Q/ What about accessibility? Please ensure stations are accessible.
- Q/ FYI, our Level 2 chargers are very low voltage vs other WNY options
- Q/ Ketter lot is very competitive now, not an ideal location
- Policy
 - Q/ Do people hog spots?
 - A/ Yes, need solutions. Top off not full charge. 3 hrs & move. All day charge free at CFT. Level 2 is 2-3 hrs restricted.
 - Q/ What about e-bikes?
 - A/ Can be charged in dorm room... but what about staff? Will assess as use grows.
 - Q/ Use license plate recognition not hang tag to support alumni and friends
 - A/ Considering charging for permit to use charging stations, might allow "free use" for permit holders then support paid use for non UB constituents
 - Q/ Any planning for e-scooters?
 - A/ had Bird in to look at their product but legislation does not allow use
 - A/ UPD will not ticket them but UB not yet welcoming them. Will need to dialog with students.
 - A/ Concerns: safety, real value vs bikes, and poor behavior (where left)
- On the front burner this spring/summer for Parking & Transportation
 - Fraudulent use of ADA placards, will provide UB permits to improve management of parking spots
 - Motorist Assist Program: available during business hours (jump start, battery check, air)
 - Electric buses: pilot demo of three vehicles
 - How to maximize use of parking inventory within Ellicott Complex and park & ride lots
 - Standard system updates and LPR for Enforcement: paving on South Campus
 - Summer rehabs:
 - Gateway/EOC Lot downtown (PARCS and pave)
 - NFTA Park & Ride Lot on South Campus pave
 - Potential to rehab Sherman and Diefendorf Lots
 - Annual lot restriping across both campuses
 - Dialog with Uber/Lyft regulating pick-up/drop-off points
 - Ridership down from 13,000 daily to about 11,000
 - o Enhance bicycling amenities and infrastructure
 - more fix-it stands
 - adjust bike lane markings
 - 24 new u-racks summer '19
 - working with GBNRTC on connecting campuses to surrounding community
 - bike share membership is now 448
- Issues needing input (infrastructure, policy, payment)
