GUEST PRESENTATION

Campus Sustainability Efforts - Ryan McPherson, Chief Sustainability Officer

- Returning after several months to report on progress and action on our feedback.
- Last Climate Action Plan was 350 pages and hard for people to digest.
- Why?
 - Important to understand why we are doing this: science, moral imperative and personal responsibility... bottom line for UB admin is business case (financial savings, retention, rankings), and what students value (recruitment).
 - Business costs, focus on carbon emissions (electricity, mobility, heating & cooling).
 - Students: 46% value sustainability, 31% boycott unsustainable companies, 40% think climate change is biggest challenge we face.
 - NYS policy most aggressive in country. SUNY/UB can play leadership role.
 - o Carbon neutrality requires systems change and individual action.
- What?
 - Three types of emissions: university heating/transportation; indirect (electricity production); constituent transportation.
 - o Big missing factor is from food choices. Not in UB usage chart, hard to capture.
 - Hard to capture data and portray so can be understood. Developing a portal.
- How? (next steps)
 - o Build off 2009 Climate Action Plan but hard to understand. Now dated but goals are good.
 - Emerging climate action strategy. Ten years to act. Ten objectives. Each will have a working group with key constituents and key milestones.
 - One example, pivotal, requires placing monetary value on carbon. Allowance for each dean/building, if they exceed, they must pay. Travel allocation with real cost. Non-green commuting would incur a fee to purchase offsets.
 - o partnering with local governments and peers (Buff State).
 - Wondering where to buy off-site electricity, local or best ROI.
 - o Senior leadership has embraced ideas. Again meeting with stakeholders, taking feedback.
- Concerns or Questions?
 - Q/ Social Work has strategic plan. Are you talking to the deans?
 - A/ Would love to discuss.
 - Q/ Would divestment and reinvestment in green energy help ranking?

Office of University Shared Governance Professional Staff Senate

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- A/ A socially responsible investing group of employees and students advised UBF.
 But decisions are not so easy. Most of money is in mutual funds which are diversified.
- o Q/ Some universities are not divesting to maintain a voice in the decision making.
- O Q/ How are we thinking about electric vehicles?
 - A/ Policies, plans, infrastructure for green commuting. NYSERDA grant for charging stations. Hope to have more 15 more charging stations on campus by summer. No charge initially but UB thinking of cost recovery. Special hang tags.

- The Staff Assistant in the UB Office of Shared Governance will be a voting member

GUEST PRESENTATION

UB Financial Accountability – Kara Kearney-Saylor, Internal Audit

- Been at UB three years, came to build up internal auditing procedures.
- Focus on internal controls, costs savings, maximizing efficiency, meeting university goals.
- Methods; audits, advisories, special reviews.
- Looks at high risk area (handle lots of cash), business risks, initiatives.
- Initiatives: whistleblower hotline, university-wide risk assessment, enterprise risk management, support for external audits.
- Office of State Controller can be interesting (e.g. \$900k in 'questionable purchases'). \$300k was focused actually approved by the other branch of State Controller's office. Focus of concern was on

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one vendor, wasn't sure if best value, 8-yrs old (people had retired, missing documents), unclear if whole amount was delivered and best prices were documented and found. Wanted more details on UBF contracts.

- Questions:
 - o Q/ in case of state controller, where does opinion stop and oversight take over?
 - A/ Always both in tandem, any big item needs approval by OSC.
 - O Q/ what is monetary threshold for formal bid process?
 - A/\$50,000
 - O/ do t-shirts need to be bid out?
 - A/ No, but need documentation to prove looked for good price.
 - OSC does look back and ding people, but her philosophy is to look forward.
 - Q/ Advice on whistleblower line?
 - A/ When have no avenue to report something questionable monetarily.
 - O Q/ How big is Internal Audit?
 - A/ Seven staff.
 - Q/ You mentioned auditing tuition. What about Excelsior?
 - A/ No, just payments in vs. out, but could change.
