FEATURED SPEAKERS – Don Erb & Ryan Taughrin

Don Erb: That was Then, This is Now

- Erb outlined how the University can change in the span of a career. Erb showed a picture of North campus in the 1970s as well as a recent picture of North campus to highlight the expansion of the University in 50 years.
- Word clouds from from the 1970s versus today, what people thought was important to their jobs.
- Erb also talked about technological advances particularly ChatGPT which is able to generate quotations based on two individuals, in this case Maya Angelou and Winston Churchill.

Ryan Taughrin: The Future of Higher Ed.

- Taughrin highlighted staffing issues in the future, the great resignation, flexible working options are all things that the University needs to consider for future staffing.
- Almost 76% of those seeking new job opportunities are doing so to get a pay/salary increase
 according to one employee retention survey that Taughrin found, followed by remote working
 possibilities (~43%).
 - Burnout is a major issue, what happens when positions are left unfilled? Because salaries are low.
 - o Narrative assumptions about the labor market are being backed-up by data.
- Future Trends to watch:
 - o Technology, but not just AI
 - We are having to become knowledge experts on technology and how to use this technology integrated into our jobs. Knowing these technologies could become a key component to one's job security, safety, or satisfaction in the future.
 - 88% of learners say educational institutions should use technology to maximize learning.
 - 67% of learners believe educational institutions are less effective in their use of technology than other industries.
 - Shifts in Student Population
 - Trying to attract new students to the same on-campus experience, by creating new majors and program offerings, is not working.
 - 41,446 degree/certificate programs have been created, yet enrollment decline has only accelerated in the past decade.
 - What students expect:
 - 79% more psychological counseling
 - 77% advising



- 67% virtual delivery options for orientation
- 63% online components for career fairs
- 55% student activities programming will use online/technology engagement.

VICE-CHAIR'S REPORT – Virginia Stever

- Stever gave a broad overview of committee affairs:
 - Budget Advisory is meeting and will have a budget to share soon with the General Membership for the planning of activities.
 - Constitution and Bylaws reports that changes to the Constitution and Bylaws were approved by a full membership vote on 11/22/23.
 - Election Committee is prepping for the Senator nomination and election season.
 - Marketing Committee, website update slated for January.



- Awards Committee, the nomination deadline for the Chancellor's Award in Professional Service has been extended to 1/8/24.
 - The other award nomination deadlines remain unchanged.
- Mentoring Sub-Committee is still looking for mentors -no experience needed to become a mentor to new professional staff.
- Inclusion and Diversity is hosting a virtual session on 12/12 to showcase the UB Center for Assistive Technology.
- Recreation and Wellness reports that their Ice Bumpercars event sold out in 23 minutes, but they are working to have another date. The Ice Bumper car event will be 1/27/24 from 1:30-3:30p.
- Stever also gave an overview of successful events in the past few weeks.
